

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National Earthquake Hazards Reduction Program (NEHRP)

- Cal OES applies to FEMA for NEHRP funding, which is then subawarded to USC for SCEC to administer ECA's earthquake education, outreach, and mitigation activities.
- NEHRP is a partnership of four federal agencies that provide resources to mitigate and reduce losses caused by earthquakes in the U.S., including support for:
 - Research on the causes and effects of earthquakes
 - Building design recommendations to reduce earthquake damage and disruption
 - Activities that advocate earthquake risk reduction awareness and practices
- ECA also receives funding from NSF and USGS via their support of SCEC.

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Who are we?

Cal OES is responsible for overseeing and coordinating emergency preparedness, response, recovery, and homeland security activities within the State of California



Hazard Mitigation Assistance Branch

Our Goal: Promote long-term resiliency through implementation of mitigation measures that reduce the loss to life and property from future disasters



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What is hazard mitigation?

Any sustained action taken to reduce or eliminate long-term risk to life and property from **natural hazard events**

This is an on-going process that occurs before, during, and after disasters and serves to break the cycle of damage in hazard-prone areas

MITIGATE HAZARDS



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Public Assistance Section 406 vs Hazard Mitigation Section 404

Public Assistance

Repairs, restores, reconstructs, or replaces public facilities that are damaged or destroyed by a major disaster

Hazard Mitigation

Competitive grant programs focused on mitigating risks from future disasters through implementation of long-term independent solutions to increase protection or capacity of existing fully functioning facilities



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What do we do?

- Manage and administer Federal grant funding available through the following programs:



Specific to Presidentially-declared disasters and competitive statewide



Annually appropriated by Congress and competitive nationwide

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Building Resilient Infrastructure & Communities

Capability & Capacity Building (C&CB)

C&CB activities must result in a resource, strategy, or tangible mitigation product that will reduce or eliminate risk and damage from future natural hazards, increase resiliency, and promote a culture of preparedness



- **Implementation of Building Code Adoption and Enforcement:**
 - Evaluate adoption and/or implementation of codes that reduce risk
 - Enhance existing adopted codes to incorporate more current requirements or higher standards
 - Develop professional workforce capabilities through technical assistance and training
- **Building Strategic Partnerships:**
 - Enhance the knowledge, skills, and expertise of applicants and subapplicants in developing and managing partnerships to build whole community resilience
- **Project Scoping Activities:**
 - Scoping and developing hazard mitigation projects and alternatives, including engineering design and feasibility studies
 - Conducting outreach and coordination, evaluating at-risk facilities, collecting BCA and/or EHP data
- **Mitigation Planning and Planning-Related Activities:**
 - Mitigation planning activities funded by BRIC must result in a new FEMA approved hazard mitigation plan or contribute additional information to a FEMA-approved mitigation plan



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Climate Resiliency & Adaptation

- Floodplain and stream restoration
- Aquifer storage and recovery
- Flood diversion and storage
- Sea Level Rise
- Green infrastructure




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Wildfire Mitigation

- Ignition-resistant construction
- Defensible space measures
- Hazardous fuels reduction
- Replanting/reforestation
- Drainage improvements
- Soil stabilization
- Erosion control




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Fire Management Assistance Declaration → **HMGP**
Post Fire

HMGP Post-Fire Mitigation

- Cal OES receives an annual funding appropriation based on the total amount of all Fire Management Assistance Grants (FMAG) the State received in the Federal fiscal year
- Cal OES may elect to conduct outreach to solicit subapplications from jurisdictions impacted by wildfires
- This funding is focused on mitigation related to the post-fire environment



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When can you get involved?




- When a disaster is Federally-declared, HMGP funding becomes available
- Notice of Interest period always open via Cal OES website



- Notice of Funding Opportunity is announced by FEMA in Fall
- Notice of Interest period will open via Cal OES website
